

20th **century** Toys: teddy bears, Barbie dolls, Action Man, electronic toys, computers, games




























Changes Within Living Memory I know how toys have changed.

Rich Victorian children played with toys such as clockwork trains, rocking horses, tea sets and dolls. Poorer children played with homemade toys such as peg dolls, wooden boats and rags stuffed with sawdust to make balls or toy animals.







During the Victorian age, toys were usually made from wood, paper and metal. Modern toys are usually made of plastic as this is a safer material and easier to make things with.

Computers and consoles were invented in the 20th Century. These have got better as technology has improved.







We still play with toys our parents played with because they are popular and still fun. They might have changed the material they are made from so they are safer or have better technology.
